Curried Sea Bream Fillets with Naan Bread

Ingredients

2 sea bream fillets, skin on

1 teaspoon turmeric

1 teaspoon medium chilli powder

1 teaspoon ground coriander

Salt and pepper

2 tablespoons flour

vegetable oil for frying

2 tablespoons cucumber and mint raita

1 naan bread, sliced to serve



Method:

- 1. Spoon all the spices into a small bowl and season with salt and pepper. Stir to fully combine.
- 2. Lay the sea bream fillets skin side down on a plate and evenly scatter quarter the spice combination over each fillet. Gently rub into the flesh of the fish. (Ideally, this should be done about an hour in advance and the fish covered to dry marinate).
- 3. Add the remaining spice mixture to the flour and scatter on a plate. Bring some vegetable oil up to a fairly high heat in a frying pan.
- 4. Pat the bream fillets on their skin sides in the spiced flour and fry on the skin side until almost done. As in the previous recipe, turn off the heat and allow to complete cooking on the flesh sides for half a minute or so.
- 5. Spoon the raita into a ramekin to serve and heat the naan bread per the instructions on the pack before slicing to plate with the bream fillets.

Where to fish for BREAM

They spend their entire life within the estuary and prefer to reside in and around structure so when targeting them focus on areas such as fallen trees (snags), rock bars, mangroves, pylons, oyster leases, break walls, boat ramps and deep holes.

How to target

Black bream can be targeted from the shore or by boat, either way for better results it pays to fish close to structure. A reliable approach is to flick lures or lightly weighted baits in amongst fallen trees in the upper parts of estuaries, or around any other structure for that matter. They are a tough contender so in this scenario a firm drag setting and abrasion resistant leader will see you land better quality fish. Black bream also respond well to berley so if you prefer a passive approach throw a berley bag in the water and bring the fish to you.

Rod & Reel

A light to medium outfit consisting of a 6'-7' carbon fibre or graphite rod in the 2-6kg range paired with a light threadline reel in the 1000-3000 size range.

Line & Leader

Braided (preferred) or monofilament mainline in the 2-6lb range with a 4-10lb fluorocarbon leader. Fish heavier leader in the snags if bust-offs are frequent.



Best Lures

Popular bream lures include Jackall chubbies, Berkley gulp plastics, Squidgie plastics, Ecogear blades, vibes, small diving minnows, etc.

Best Bait

Good baits include nippers (ghost shrimp), prawns, pilchards, small strip/fillet baits, crabs, bread, pippies, beach worms & blood worms.

Hints and tips

Black bream are generally caught in estuarine habitats in the southern half of the country. They can be taken on a wide range of bait offerings and make great sport when targeted on lure with light outfits, especially in amongst the snags.

- Bream can be finicky and like a slow-sinking bait or lure. When lure fishing allow 3-5 seconds between twitching, hopping or slow rolling.
- When using fleshy baits try tweaking/bending the point of your hook outwards with pliers for a better strike rate.
- When using bait or plastics use minimum weight to keep you in the strike zone longer.
- Berleying is a good way to bring Black bream to you and keep them interested for longer. A good mix of chook pellets, bread, tuna oil, old pilchards/fish baits or crustacean shells will do the trick.

Rigging for luring

• The trend amongst anglers targeting Black bream on lure would have to be braided line but monofilament also has it's advantages. Attach the mainline to a 1-2m fluorocarbon or monofilament (for surface luring) leader with a joining knot such as an <u>Albright</u> or <u>Double Uni</u>. Attach the leader to the lure with a loop knot such as a <u>Lefty's Loop</u>, Perfection Loop or Rapala Knot. This will optimise its action and allow the lure to swim freely in the water



Rigging for bait fishing

When fishing with bait use as little weight as possible. In some situations no lead is possible which is a great way to present 'drift' baits down the burley trail. Hook to mainline as follows: Tie hook to fluorocarbon leader with a double-blood knot or other standard knot. If using weight insert a running sinker onto the leader now. Connect leader to mainline using a <u>Double uni</u> or other joining knot, or alternatively use a swivel to reduce line twist particularly when fishing with monofilament line.

PRESIDENTS REPORT

OCTOBER 2020

Following much deliberation and serious consideration your committee has decided that the 43rd Eden Amateur Fishing Competition will go ahead in March 2021. And will accommodate Covid 19 guidelines where necessary.

However, due to the very poor response to our email to club members asking for volunteers for next year's competition we will be restructuring the way in which the competition is run to relieve the pressure on our limited number of people who support our club with running this annual event.

Although not all the mechanics of how the competition will operate are finalised I can tell you that there will be a greater emphasis on online registrations and that the hours that the club rooms will be open may be reduced. We are cognisant that we welcome competition members to touch base with our team and other competitors at our rooms as this socialising is an important part as to what the competition is about.

The change that may be contentious to some competitors is that we are changing our focus from a catch and kill competition to a measure, catch, photo and release which the committee believes that this will bring our competition in line with other major competitions and see us set ourselves up to be able to hold our competition long into the future. There will be some quirky changes linked to the catch and release which should create more competition and excite fisho's who target specific species.

We do understand that many people come to our region for our competition and treat this as an annual holiday and as such want to catch a feed of fish to take home and like all fisho's we will not preclude this from occurring. It will stop the unnecessary kill of unwanted species simply to have a chance at winning a prize.

These changes may also attract additional sponsorship from other companies and businesses that in the past have not offered to be involved because we have been a catch and kill competition.

We have set up a sub committee consisting of members with the most experience in running the competition to work through the rule changes necessary and determine how the recording of entries will occur. We will also be considering increasing prize money on some species for adults and altering

the list of species that all junior competitors can target to give kids who fish solo or from the shore a greater opportunity of being competitive.

FISHING REPORT

Strong winds have accentuated whale sightings all along the coast. It is well understood that whales become more active with great thumping fin and tail splashes so that they can communicate between pods when sea conditions are "noisy".

With suitable vessels whale watchers are having a tremendous time during the windy weather and choppy seas. From shore visit the headlands for some spectacular views.

Snapper are certainly returning to the bite with some good fish taken on micro jigs off Haycock and near Boyds Tower and Mowarry. Try double hooks with light green flashers in about 15 fathoms.

Morwong are fairly quiet but some good fish have been taken in the deeper parts of Haycock reef.

Flathead are beginning to stir and some good fish have been taken in deeper waters off Short Point, try 20 fathoms.

As before flathead are also available in the shelving waters off Mowarry at about 20 fathoms.

Closer to Merimbula gummy shark are shoaling on the inshore side of the horseshoe reef with a few flathead in deeper water off eastern edge of the reef. Reports to hand of large catches of gummies are frankly disquieting.

Australian salmon are spawning in the lower part of the Merimbula and Pambula channels and while difficult to get onto the bite some have been taken on soft plastics and small plastic lures while trolling.

Tailor grace the main Merimbula Top Lake. Here it is difficult to troll because of the floating weed but drifting near a bust up and casting silver spinners can bring a great response.

The Pambula River remains the stand out fishing spot during the windy weather with salmon, tailor and trevally on the chew. Try the channel between the Shark Hole and Broadwater. Soft plastics are a must for good results, for bait try pilchards. Dusky flathead are becoming active.

Although fairly quiet for most fish at the Merimbula Fishing platform there are some fine calamari squid about at daybreak and evening. Try size 3 slow sinking jigs.

The Bega River is returning some dusky flathead from above Thompsons and at Mogareeka.

There are a few bream beside the rock wall up from the ramp.


