IT'S TIME TO START THINKING ABOUT UPDATING YOUR LIFEJACKETS



Back in 2010 the standard for lifejackets was changed from ASI 512 to AS4758.

With that change saw the change in the way we refer to our lifejackets from Type 1, 2 or 3 to Levels 100+, 50 and 50S.

For most of us it did not really mean much at all, we could continue using the lifejackets we had but that period hasn't got much longer to go.

From January 2021, the old AS 1512 PFDs/lifejackets will no longer be accepted and you must update to the current standard which is AS4758. I

DECEMBER 2020

Improved recent weather conditions has seen a good number of boats launching out of Quarantine bay, the majority being visitors and if activity around the cleaning tables is an indication many are getting a feed and really enjoying the fishing. Sadly, most of these visitors have now been forced to cut their stay short and rush home due to the recent developments in the covid pandemic.

The good news is that one of our most successful anglers and his family members have been making the most of their opportunities and have reported that the fishing at the moment is very good.

Ocean fishing is producing good catches of Mowies and Nannygai and although a little patchy and variable in size, bag limits of Flathead are being taken. Some quite large lizards have been boated in Twofold Bay and the Saltwater Creek ground is working well, just be prepared to move around to find a patch. Snapper numbers may have dropped off but there are still a few about with some good fish taken on Micro Jigs and soft plastics while Slimy Mackerel or Pilchard is the best bait. A nice haul of Calamari Squid and some smallish Gummy Sharks were seen on the cleaning tables along with a number of the less desirable species.

The lakes, rivers and estuaries are also fishing well for Dusky Flathead, Whiting, Bream and Trevally, with Salmon and Tailor are moving around the entrances and channels. Wonboyn, the Bega River, Merimbula and Pambula lakes and Kiah Inlet all get a mention.

Interestingly, it has been noticed that the best fishing has coincided with the timing of the recent prawn runs, so there is a good tip.

Fish of the month news: Sand Whiting was the target fish for December and the competition was strong. Congratulations to the winners Jenny and Gordon Rugg and junior winners Isabella Howlett and Lachlan Carson, no surprises there.



Fish of the month for January is the humble Slimy Mackerel and anyone can catch one of these. They frequent local wharfs and Jetties where a bit of burley works wonders if they are about. They also roam the oceans and bays in schools, look for surface action or baitfish on your sounder. Most Slimy Mackerel are caught within a few metres of the surface, a light outfit rigged

with a size 2-4 hook under a small ball sinker is all the gear you need. Pilchard or other fish flesh is a good bait while, small shiny lures or baitfish jigs will also work.

Slimy Mackerel are great fishing fun for kids and although largely shunned as a table fish they do have some admirers and they do smoke up well. They are a great fresh bait and lightly salted fillets will keep in the freezer for a good few months.

Called slimy mackerel in Australia, they are found all over the world. In Australia they are considered arguably the best baitfish available for many target species but are seldom thought as table fare. However, in many places they are revered as an eating fish, particularly in colder waters.







The secret to cooking mackerel is to remove two boneless and skinless strips of flesh from each fillet. One strip from above the bloodline, the other strip from below the bloodline.

- 1 Getting prepared: two slimy mackerel fillets and a slimy mackerel alongside for comparison.
- 2 To remove the bones, make an incision down to (but not through) the skin above the pin bones and bloodline (which run the full length of the fillet). The line of pin bones that run the full length down the middle of the fillet will remain attached to the skin. Then turn the knife outwards and cut the flesh away from the centre and remove the strip of fish flesh from the dorsal part of the fillet.
- 3 Next remove the rib bones from the belly half of the fillet.
- 4 Now skin the bottom half of the fillet. Using a blade longer than the fillet you can skin in the opposite direction to normal. Make a cut into the flesh below the pin bones and then cut the flesh strip away from the remaining skin and pin bones, ensuring that you have no bones in the strip that is intended for the table. The remainder should now be the skin with a row of pin bones still attached.
- 5 Two mackerel strips (one from the upper section of the fillet and the other from the lower section of the fillet) on the right ready for cooking. Note that the rib 'flaps' make good bream baits and the flesh and skin left overs make good berley.





Recipe

This recipe is a concept rather than a rigid amount of ingredients.

The seasoned flour consists of plain flour mixed with a generous amount of salt and pepper. The mackerel fillets are coated in this mixture and then sautéed in a little butter until almost cooked through. Don't overcook as the mackerel as it will continue to cook in the pan when removed from the heat.

I remove the fillets from the pan and add chopped herbs to the butter in the pan. This herb buttery mixture is then spooned over the cooked mackerel. I have used chives in the photo for this recipe, but you can add almost any herb of your choice. The robust oily flavours of the mackerel will team with most herbs; my favourites are thyme, coriander, or chives.

6 To serve, place the mackerel fillets on a plate and spoon the herb butter sauce over the fillets.

A squeeze of lemon lifts the tastes in the dish


